The Museum has been a hive of activity in the past month as we prepare for our mammoth move – and it's only going to get busier. In September, we'll start shifting the collection offsite.

This is a monumental job -2.3 million taonga (treasures) need to be moved in a matter of months! The mood around the building is one of excitement, although there's definitely some trepidation in the mix as well.

I thought I'd use this opportunity to lay out how the Museum will be changing, both in terms of the physical galleries and the services we offer, in the next 6 months as we move towards our long-awaited redevelopment.



The Road Ahead

The Museum will remain open as we start to move the collection and staff to offsite storage and offices. However, from mid-October we will start progressively closing galleries to dismantle and pack the displays.

By the end of November, the galleries on Level 3 will be pretty much empty. We'll start packing down the Level 1 galleries from December. We're also planning a blockbuster farewell exhibition which will be a fundraiser for the redevelopment. Keep an eye out for this in early 2023.

The Museum will shut its Rolleston Avenue doors in April 2023 for construction to start. Building and fitting out the new Museum is a huge and complex project and we anticipate it will take around 5 years.

This is a very exciting time for everyone here, but as you can imagine it's also a very busy one! Almost everyone will be dedicated to the task of packing and moving the collections to the new site. This means that we won't be able to offer our usual range of services, as outlined later in this newsletter.

We're sorry for any inconvenience, but we hope you can share in our excitement as we finally embark on this long-awaited and much-needed redevelopment. We can all look forward to a world-class visitor experience and first-rate collections care in the new Museum.

Watch out for a temporary Museum popping up in the central city in 2023. We'll share news about this and progress on the redevelopment on our website, social media and in this newsletter.

Thank you for your support of the Museum as we navigate this exciting but challenging time.
